counting toward a Championship for the driver or the car maker who had the greatest success during the year. Throughout the world there are hundreds of such Championships in the many nations where racing is popular, and perhaps ten of them are internationally famed.

The rules governing these races, Championships and the cars allowed to run in them, fill many books with thin paper and fine print, their purpose being to assure some equality among the cars, consistency in the race conduct, and safety to the drivers. Times have changed since the first motor race in France on July 22, 1894, from Paris to Rouen. Paragraph nine of its regulations stated, in effect, "All models of cars shall be admitted, provided they run. That is all

we ask. The rest will follow." Follow it did, the sport growing with the popularity of cars and the love of the industrialized world for speed.

The anonymity of city traffic in which we behave rudely and selfishly behind our tinted glass windows and cryptic license plate numbers does not exist on the race track. To each racer the machine just ahead or just behind is not a car but a person, one with a known combination of virtues and defects, a total living organism with interlinked synapses of sinews and steel, pulsing circuits of electricity, breath, blood and oil. It is a competitor, a machine-age centaur of man and car, with whom this racer has battled before, whom he must try to defeat today, and against whom he will fight again.

By their heraldry the drivers are known, by their rainbow-hued helmets and cars with their names blazoned on the sides. Some of them are friends; some are indeed brothers. But they are not often personally close. "I do not believe there can be much deep friendship," writes Enzo Ferrari, "between men whose job obliges them every weekend to pit their skill and courage one against the other and risk their lives in doing so. It would be more precise and accurate, I think, to speak of comradeship." Much like other sports in this way, motor racing demands a solitary dedication and determination to one's own aims, together with a sportsmanlike and just outlook toward one's competitors. For the penalty for a serious error is exceedingly high.

"All through man's history," wrote Harry A. Overstreet, "there has been a competition between the safe and the adventurous; the fully informed and the to-be-informed; between the 'pattern set for all men' and the glimmer of a gleam for men to follow." The motor racer breaks with the pattern and chases that tantalizing distant flame. At speed.
